CONTINENTAL QUALIFIERS

Over 1.000 video submissions in total, but only 916 were according to the rules and regulations!

6 October - 2 December 2017

The best 5 B-Boys / B-Girls per country qualified for the Continental Qualifiers in Philadelphia (USA), Essen (GER) and Chinese Taipei (TPE).

The 20 best B-Boys and the 10 best B-Girls of each of the 3 Continental Qualfiers – with a maximum of 3 B-Boys and 2 B-Girls per country – advanced to the next stage.

WDSF WORLD YOUTH BREAKING CHAMPIONSHIPS

20 May 2018

The 2018 WDSF World Youth Breaking Championships held in Kawasaki (Japan) determined the 12 B-Boys and the 12 B-Girls (1 per NOC) who represent their countries/NOC's at the Buenos Aires 2018 Summer Youth Olympic Games:

COMPETITION FORMAT

The competition consists of BATTLES between two breakers/mixed teams → A battle is a direct confrontation/comparision of two or several breakers

- Each battle consist of a fixed number of rounds
- In each round one breaker/mixed team performs first, then the other responds
- Each round is judged by five judges against six criteria and two head judges overseeing the competition



<u>Mixed Team:</u> Each team is composed of one girl and one boy paired according to the final ranking of the 1vs1 battles.


The competition format is the same as for the 1vs1 battles.


